- (1) Meeting *Called to Order* by President Javiar Benitez at 6:35 pm.
- (2) The *Pledge of Allegiance* was recited by the 35 members in attendance.
- (3) *The Program*: The Meeting Program was the 2024 Show Report and the ancillary discussion regarding the results and workings of the show.
- (4) Business Meeting: After a lunch with snacks provided by Tim & Gail Perrin, Dave & Debbie Elftman, and Mary Rettler, who also brought in Cupcakes as a treat all with the KMGS Logo in the frosting, and some juice. The Business Meeting was reconvened and the was called to order at 7:36 pm.
- (5) Three New Guests were present. Mary Cullinan, Paul Dix, & Diane Sills.
- (6) Meeting Minutes: The Reading of the Minutes was dispensed with as they are printed in the Kettle Krier.
- (7) *Treasurers Report:* The report was read by Treasurer Don Shervey. Motion To Accept as read by Monica Daley. Seconded by Gail Perrin. Motion Carried.
- (8) *Tech Committee:* Javier Benitez reported that the Website "crashed" the day before the show but was up and running by Saturday Morning. He solicited input on how to improve it, and there was some input from the floor on fixing the "bugs" and additions from what was used in the past. If anyone has any issues with the website, or comments or concerns, they should contact him to be addressed.
- *(9) Education Committee Report*: Mike Andrysczyk offered to present his "program" to the membership as a program when needed. He also reported on the two past programs presented at schools.
- (10) Jr, Rockhound (JRH) Committee Report: Ori Anna Ramsey reported that the JRH had 9 displays at the show, and is looking to produce a "Information Packet" to distribute to area schools and elsewhere to grow the JRH organization.
- (11) The JRH will have a lapidary Class for April 13th, at the Menomonee falls Library, at 10:30 am. On May 11th, a Field trip to the Lannon Quarry is planned, the bus leaves at 1:00pm. On May 8th, a field trip to the Maribel caves south of Breen Bay is being planned.
- (12) Program Committee Report: Mary Nettesheim noted that the April Program will be the Geology Made Practical DVD.
- (13) Sunshine Committee Report: Birthdays for the month are posted in the Kettle Krier.
- (14) Show Committee Report: John Rettler stated that the show was a success. We set a record in attendance with 2,352 attendees. (1,855 adults & 497 Under 12).

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(15) (Old Business) None brought up.

(16) (New Business)

- (17) John Rettler noted that while it is still in good shape, as much use as the "Sifter" is getting at the show, the club should consider rebuilding or replacing it, as it is almost 50 years old, and getting "wiggly". Any craftsman who is interested in the project should look at it and the club should be prepared to build a second one or refurbish the existing one.
- (18) Tony Ilecki noted that we need additional space for storing club gear, as the trailer is "full". A committee of Tony Ilecki, Dave Elftman, & Javier Benitez will look into options and report back to the Board of Directors.

(19) Announcements:

- (20) At the Show the Rettlers brought a Digital Microscope to examine a close-up view of rocks etc. It drew a lot of attention. Tim Perrin suggested the Club buy one for The Education Committee to use when doing presentations at schools and other events. The motion was made by Janet Schmitt to spend up to \$200 to purchase one. Seconded by Gail Perrin. Motion carried.
- (21) Charles Cooksey noted that Dr. Danielle McKay took notice of our Show and the introduction of Earth Science and Geology to youth at the Kids Korner, and we may be getting some positive "Press" from her experience from our show.
- (22) John Rettler reported on the MWF Meeting where the KMGS was represented in Janesville. It was also announced that the MWF accepted our application to host the 2027 MWF Convention. Details will be handled by the Show Committee and reported as they unfold to the membership.
- (23) It was announced that a quorum of the Board of Directors met prior to the meeting, and the application for membership for Randy Engebretson & Carol Schrock was approved.
- (24) The "Goodie Detail" for April will be Javier Benitez & Dave & Debbie Elftman. A sign-up sheet for 2024 was circulated, and only October and November have only a partial commitment.
- (25) A Motion to adjourn was made by Gail Perrin. Seconded by Mike Andrysczyk. Motion Carried at 8:47 pm.





AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MINERALOGICAL SOCIETIES CODE OF ETHICS FOR ROCK COLLECTING

I will respect both public and private property and will do no collecting on privately owed land without permission from the owner. Type to enter text

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of the property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting materials in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material – matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes that may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to use fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will report to my club or Federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will, at all times, conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of rockhounds everywhere.
