



KMGS Field Trip - Cherney Maribel Caves

Saturday June 8th began as a drizzly mild temperatures day, which eventually gave way to sunlight and became a warm sunny day. The two-hour drive along Lake Michigan to Manitowoc County was a pleasant drive with scattered communities amidst the scenery of large regions and tracts of agricultural land.



We arrived at the Cherney Maribel Caves County Park and visited with the other KMGS members and guests as they arrived. Despite the rainy beginning the day, the 34 club members and guests of our group

assembled and picnicked at the shelter as the sun broke through the clouds.

At one o'clock, Andy Krahn, our Tour Guide from the Wisconsin Speleological Society, began

an informative presentation of the history of the Cherney Maribel Caves, who discovered them, what to see, and what to expect.

Andy was well qualified to provide the tour, as he himself was part of the exploration and restoration of the caves. Beginning with surveys and research, doing some of the first "belly crawls", and restorative digging and excavation.





Andy was highly informative, as we ventured

down the stairs and along the gravel manicured paths at the base of the escarpment, and eventually into what would become several hundred of the thousands of feet of subterranean caves.

He would stop along the way pointing out the different entrances, the various limestone sediment formations, the effects of surface water, and the glacial sediment which filled the voids, even the vegetation and weather-related conditions which effect the evolution of the various caves.

The Maribel Caves consists of eleven

caves along what is a part of the Niagara Escarpment. Many simply appeared to be a cavernous hole, or hollow space under an outcropping, and a few where the students could crawl and disappear out of sight, only to emerge from one side just twenty feet away, to give them a true Spelunking experience.

Other caves, often behind a locked door for obvious reasons, had "rooms" almost 30 feet around, and tunnels high enough to walk upright between the shallow pools of trickling water. The cavernous "rooms" and naturally eroded "hallways" had lights installed to make the entire tour a fascinating look into the subsurface area of the earth most will never see.



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Formed somewhere between the most recent Ordovician Period (440-500 million years ago) and the Permian-Triassic Extinction (250 million Years ago), when Wisconsin was covered by the most recent sea-scape, which deposited hundreds if not thousands of feet or more of sediment. The waters and natural carbonic acid eroded the edges of the escarpment and created the limestone karst and rock formations.

The sea was filled with all sorts of creatures and critters, many of which died or were trapped and became fossilized, and now remain for study and viewing in the limestone making up the karst. Eventually, glacial sediment prior to; or during the last ice age, filling the crevices and sinkholes with glacial sediment. As the glaciers melted, the rushing water enlarged the existing caves, and carved the West Twin River Valley alongside the escarpment.

Then frost action loosened rock from the cliff face, most of which partially or fully closing or covering the cave entrances, until they were discovered in 1892.

This was privately owned property, and in 1900 the owner built the Maribel Caves Hotel. The hotel replicated the attributes of Europe's medieval castles, complete with rounded towers, arching facades, and walls gilded with limestone. The resort also sported stables and a bathhouse, with running water from the natural springs, and for several decades housed tourists who came to see the caves and enjoy the therapeutic natural waters.

In 1985 a fire gutted the interior of the structure, and the 75-acre property was sold to Manitowoc County for a park, in 2013, a tornado finished the job, by removing the roofs, and now the ruins of the three building stand as a



testament to the once stately castle-like hotel and resort, as a milestone near the end of our tour.

We completed the tour and returned to the parking lot around 3:30 pm, bid farewell to our guide and friends, and began our return home. It was a terrific field trip, to a little known but remarkable geological location just two hours away from home.

Many thanks to Ori Anna Ramsey for making the arrangements, Andy Krahn, for the education and the tour, to the Wisconsin Speleological Society for their work to maintain the caves, and to Manitowoc County for preserving and allowing access to the outstanding geological exhibit.

THE LAST WORD

So the 4th of July is upon us. The time to celebrate another birthday of the U.S.A. There will be picnics and outings of other sorts. The smell of charring steaks, brats and burgers will fill the air. Libations from lemonade to beer, to other adult concoctions will be consumed to help us stay hydrated during the hot day. And at the end of the day there will be fireworks. We will all "ooh!!" and "aah!!" at the beautiful displays of colorful sparks in the sky accompanied by loud explosive noises. But during the great show in the sky, how many will think of the connection fireworks has to geology and rockhounding?

True. Each burst of color depends on the mixture of minerals in the device. Strontium emits a deep red. A combination of titanium, zirconium and magnesium burns white. While copper bursts with a blue hue. Barium gives off a green aura, sodium is yellow and the gold sparks are produced by iron filings and charcoal pieces. While this is a simplified explanation of the colors, you can see how it takes geology and chemistry to make the show.

AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MINERALOGICAL SOCIETIES CODE OF ETHICS FOR ROCK COLLECTING

I will respect both public and private property and will do no collecting on privately owed land without permission from the owner. Type to enter text

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of the property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting materials in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material – matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes that may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to use fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will report to my club or Federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will, at all times, conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of rockhounds everywhere.
